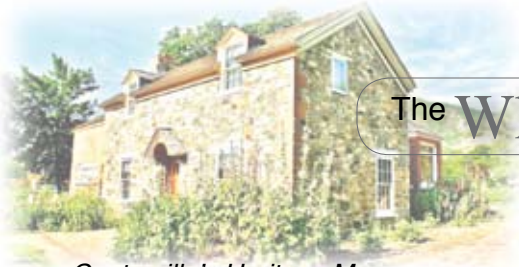

MUNICIPAL ELECTION 2015

The election of three (3) Councilmembers (4-year terms) will be on the ballot for the Centerville City 2015 Municipal Election. Also on the ballot will be a question of whether to renew the RAP tax. (Please see an explanation of RAP tax in the box at right.)

Candidate filing period begins June 1, 2015 and ends at 5:00 p.m. on June 8, 2015, excluding Saturday and Sunday (UCA 20A-1-401). Declaration of Candidacy must be filed in person at the Centerville City Recorder's Office located at 250 North Main.

RAP TAX ON BALLOT

The R.A.P. tax, (1/10th of 1% sales tax) approved by voters in 2007, and currently used to fund the construction of the Davis Center for the Performing Arts (CenterPoint Theatre) will be up for renewal and on the ballot again in November 2015. If re-approved by voters and authorized by the City Council, it is expected that most of the funds would go towards improving parks and trails. More information on parks and trails master plans will be shared in a future newsletter.

DRAINAGE FEES INCREASING THIS SUMMER

Following an extensive public information effort and public hearing, the City Council recently approved drainage fee increases that will first appear on the monthly bill at the end of July. These fees—known as “drainage utility” and “subsurface drain” fees on the monthly utility bills—have not increased since being imposed in 1999 and 2001, respectively. As explained in utility bill inserts in January and February, increases are needed to fund the replacement of many existing pipes and culverts, and to continue maintenance of 63 miles of storm drains and subsurface drains (“subdrains”). The recent update of the Drainage Master Plan recommends \$6.3 million in capital projects over the next 10 years.

The City Council studied various funding scenarios—both with and without new debt—and chose to fund the need without issuing new debt. Fees will increase as shown below:

- ✓ The drainage utility fee (for stormwater system) would increase from the current \$4 per month for a single family home to \$8.48 per month. Other property owners - businesses, churches, schools, apartment buildings - are assessed fees based on a formula that compares the amount of hard surface area on those properties to a single family home.
- ✓ The subsurface drain fee (for subdrain system) is currently \$2 per month for a home outside a subdrain district and \$6 per month for a home inside a subdrain district. This fee will increase to \$4.24 outside a subdrain district or \$12.72 inside a subdrain district. The rationale for charging a subsurface fee to all developed properties is because all residents use roads in the high groundwater areas, and the life of these roads is prolonged by the effective operation of those subdrains.

KEEPING IT CLEAN

Each spring, residents take to their yards and gardens to clean up and prepare for the growing season. Following city ordinances during these activities is critical for the proper maintenance of our City’s flood control and drainage systems. Chapter 16-04 of the City Code includes the following regulations:

- ✦ Tracking mud, gravel, or any other material onto the public roadway is illegal. Please clean off vehicles BEFORE getting back on the road.

- ✦ It is illegal to allow construction materials, dirt, gravel, topsoil, mulch, tree limbs, etc. to be delivered or dumped in the roadway, gutter, or anywhere else that may directly impact the storm drain system except when authorized by the City (such as the annual green waste pickup).

- ✦ It is unlawful to place dumpsters of any kind in the public right of way without a permit. They not only restrict travel in streets or on sidewalks, but they may pollute the storm drain system.

Violation of ANY storm water ordinance may be punishable up to and including a Class B Misdemeanor.

CENTERVILLE CEMETERY REMINDER

Spring cleanup of all grave decorations is the **first week of April**.



Cemetery visitors are asked to please help our maintenance staff by collecting all grave decorations that will impede the care of the cemetery grounds. Mowing season is from April 1st to November 1st.

Memorial Day cleanup begins the Monday following Memorial Day when all decorations that have not been retrieved will be discarded. Depending on the amount of decorations left to be cleaned up it usually takes two to five days to complete.

SPRING CLEAN-UP



Centerville is scheduling a FREE green waste pickup beginning April 13th. You may begin putting your green waste on the street next to the curb April 10th. Bland Tree Experts, Inc. will be going down the city streets only one time, so please have your green waste in place no later than the evening of April 12th.

Remember:

- Limit your waste to one dump truck load
- Keep your items away from mailboxes, trash cans and parked cars.
- Do not bag or box your items.
- Clean green waste only – no grass clippings, sod, appliances, etc.
- Branches and tree stumps cannot be any larger than 8-10 ft long and 12-18 inches in diameter – **root balls cannot be picked up.**
- Keep the green waste off the park strip – the heavy machinery could damage your lawn.
