MESSAGE FROM THE MAYOR by Mayor Paul Cutler

Fall is in the air and it's a beautiful time to be outdoors in Centerville. I hope you have taken advantage of the weather and enjoyed the many outdoor activities available in our community.

On October 8, the Centerville Trails Committee sponsored a ribbon cutting to celebrate the completion of the Parrish Lane pedestrian bridge over I-15 and the new connection to the Legacy Parkway Trail. I invite you to get outside and take advantage of this new connection.

Recently, the Davis County Health Department published an updated profile with health statistics for our community. Most of the results were very positive when compared to state and county averages, and reflect healthy lifestyle choices that many citizens are striving for. For example, we ranked very high in life expectancy (83.2 years), and relatively low in adolescent births (4.3%), adult obesity (20.1%), diabetes prevalence (4.6%), adult smoking (5.7%) and stroke deaths per 100,000 (5.7%).

Along with the good news, there were also some statistics that are concerning. Statistics suggest that our community has relatively high rates of melanoma (54.7 per 100,000) and breast cancer (154.3 per 100,000). More sobering is the fact that we have higher incidents of drug overdose (13.8 per 100,000) and suicide (15.2 per 100,000) compared to state averages. To put this in perspective, in our community suicide deaths are more than twice as likely as a fatal car accident (7.5 per 100,000).

The high rates of death from drug overdose (especially opioids) and suicide should concern all of us. Medical and behavioral health professionals encourage us to talk with our family, friends, and neighbors about drugs and suicide. Talking about these problems decreases the risk of future incidents. If a friend, neighbor, or family member is at risk, please reach out to help, and take action to remove easy access to guns, illicit drugs, and harmful prescription medications. There are many community, state, and religious resources available—but the first step is awareness.

In Centerville, we have a great tradition of volunteering, and looking out for the well being of our neighbors. Let's make sure that includes all aspects of life, including mental and behavioral health.

SHARING THE ROAD

In 2015, the League of American Bicyclists ranked Utah the fifth most Bicycle Friendly State in the U.S., up from number eight in 2014. Utah is fortunate to have so many agencies, local governments and advocacy groups working together to promote bike friendliness in our state. Yet as more cyclists hit the road, conflicts between motorists and cyclists are increasing.

Bike laws are simple, but often misunderstood by motorists and cyclists alike. According to Utah Code 41-6a-1102, a bicycle is considered a vehicle and has the same rights and is subject to the same provisions as the operator of any other vehicle. This includes obeying traffic signals, stop and yield signs, and using hand signals before turning. While motorists have limited influence on other motorists obeying the rules, the same goes for cyclists. Most drivers and cyclists are careful and considerate, but because of the actions of a few it can become an "us" vs. "them" mentality.

Cyclists must ride as near as practical along the right edge of the roadway, and can ride up to two abreast but may not impede the normal movement of traffic. When cyclists are riding in a lane that is too narrow for

both car and bike to travel safely side by side, the bike may take the full lane (Utah Code 41-6a-1105). When you see cyclists not riding as far to the right as may appear possible, it's generally due to them wanting to avoid debris on the edge of the roadway surface, as this debris can cause a flat tire or a crash. Regardless of the position or speed of the cyclist, motorists are required to keep a safe distance and wait until they can pass safely, giving cyclists a minimum of 3 feet (Utah Code 41-6a-706.5).



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We the authors are motorists and cyclists. We love living in a bike-friendly community with access to so many great roads and trails. We've experienced these common frustrations from both viewpoints. When motorists and cyclists know and follow the law, it leads to courtesy and respect on the road. Surely respecting the rights of others on the road is a goal for which we can all strive in our friendly community of Centerville.

NEW AND IMPROVED UTA SERVICE

Starting August 14, UTA has added service! Trips have been added to Express Route 473, which runs from Ogden to Salt Lake and the U of U, including a new trip from Farmington to Weber State University, and route 455, which runs from Ogden to Salt Lake City.

Additional Saturday service is now available on route 640, which provides service from Layton Hills Mall to Weber State. The Lagoon/Station Park Shuttle (route 667) has begun year-round service, and UTA will debut the Midtown Trolley (route 628) with service between Layton and Clearfield.

All improvements are made possible by the passage of Prop 1 in Davis and Weber counties. Check rideuta.com for more details.

CENTERVILLE EARTHQUAKE BOOT CAMP

WATER SYSTEM RECEIVES TOP NATIONAL AWARD FOR ENERGY EFFICIENCY

Centerville City's culinary drinking water system was recently recognized by the National Rural Water Association for exemplary efforts in energy efficiency. The City has developed and implemented 20 creative strategies to optimize water system energy savings. These practical strategies enable Centerville City to reduce energy costs 75% which equates to \$250,000 savings on electrical costs annually, while consistently providing high quality water to its citizens. The City's water system was selected from among 31,000 water systems within the United States, and received this honor on September 13, 2016.




